

The children started asking a lot of questions about baptism and why it is important. James, who was older and in **confirmation**, said that his class had just started learning about baptism.

"Baptism is bringing the baby to Jesus," James declared.

"Yes, it is that," Dad responded, "but baptism is much more than asking Jesus to bless a baby. In baptism, God makes a child His own by His grace through the water and the Word."

"We have brought all of you children to be baptized in response to God's command and invitation," continued Mom. "Ian will be baptized in the name of the Triune God—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. He will receive the gifts of forgiveness, faith, salvation, and the Holy Spirit, just as each of you have.

28:19–20. Then he explained, "Jesus calls us to disciple all people through baptism and the teaching of the Word of God."

"The verse I remember most about



baptism," Mom said, "is I Peter 3:21. Verse 20 shows how God saved Noah and his family through the water which carried the ark that Noah had built. The waters of the flood brought death and destruction to unbelievers, but the same water saved Noah and his family who were on the ark. Then verse 21 says, "Corresponding to that [the water that saved Noah], baptism now saves you."

James interrupted. "Pastor told us that Baptism is called a **sacrament**. Do you know what a sacrament is?"

Mom smiled and said, "Why don't you tell us, James."

"Okay," James replied. "A sacrament is an act of God in which He uses something visible to give something invisible."

"You're right, James." Dad went on to explain, "Baptism is a means through which God gives His invisible grace to us. The water is the visible part we can see and touch in baptism. But we must remember that without the Word of God, the water is simply water. It is God's Word through the water that works salvation and faith in a child."

Children are very precious to God. He planned for you to be born; He chooses you to be His. Jesus told His disciples in Mark 10 that He wants little children to come to Him. In baptism, God puts His name upon you and you become His child. He promises to always take care of you, delivering you from sin, death, and the power of Satan. He promises that you will live with Him for all eternity.

After a child is baptized, he must be taught the Word of God and learn to pray so that his faith and love for Jesus will continue to grow. Without the Word and prayer, the faith God has given a child will not remain and **thrive**. The child may little by little lose his faith and love for Jesus.

Faith is a gift from God. In baptism, you received faith, salvation, and the Holy Spirit. Since the Holy Spirit is living in you, He will continue His work in your life, keeping you close to Jesus through His Word.


