
Lesson 11



JESUS' DEATH

Think about it. Jesus, God's only Son, died for us. He never sinned, yet He took the sins of the world on Himself when He died on the cross. God has such great love for all people. He wants all men to be saved and come to the knowledge of the Truth (I Timothy 2:4).

The account of Jesus' trials, crucifixion, and death is told in all four Gospels. This was a tragedy for His disciples, and it was only after His resurrection that they would understand. Jesus' sacrifice meant hope and salvation for them and for all who would believe.

THE UNJUST TRIALS

From the time of Jesus' arrest in the Garden of Gethsemane until He was nailed to the cross, Jesus went through five trials. According to Jewish and Roman law, trials were not to be held after dark. There was also to be at least one day's time between trials. The five trials of Jesus, all held during the course of one night, were not legal trials.

Jesus didn't complain about how He was treated. He suffered and died willingly, knowing this was God's plan. Jesus' death on the cross paid the debt for the sins of all people, including you. His sacrifice was even for the men who pounded the nails into His hands and feet.

ROMAN CRUCIFIXION

- To crucify means "to fasten to a stake or pole."
- Roman crucifixion was a painful, horrible, slow way to die. It involved tying or nailing the guilty person to a crossbeam which was then attached to a pole. The criminal was left hanging until he died. Death by crucifixion was a great disgrace.
- In the Roman world, only slaves and foreigners were put to death by crucifixion. Roman citizens were protected by law from the pain and shame of crucifixion.
- Because the Jews were under Roman rule, Jewish authorities could not put a man to death. Only Roman authorities could carry out the death sentence.

Fast Fact: Scourging



- A scourge was a whip with several cords or leather straps bound together and weighted with jagged pieces of bone or metal.
- It was brought into Jewish life by the Syrians and legalized by Jewish law, which fixed the maximum number of blows to 40 for flogging (Deuteronomy 25:3).
- A person sentenced to scourging was stripped and fastened to a pole or frame. The blows were applied to the backside but sometimes even to the face and abdomen. Most people who were scourged lost consciousness, and many died.
- After Jesus was scourged, He was forced to carry His own cross (John 19:17).
